## Thursday, March 20

The 33rd Annual Environmental Film Festival in the Nation's Capital opened at the US Navy Memorial with the DC Premiere of *The White House Effect* preceded by a special message from Senator Edward Markey. The climate-focused screening was followed by a conversation (pictured above) with Natural Resources Defense Council President Manish Bapna, director Pedro Kos, producer Noah Stahl, moderated by *Washington Post* Deputy Climate and Environment Editor Juliet Eilperin.

Strong collaboration between elected officials, frontline advocates, and storytellers, like those amongst us today, create an immovable foundation for the fight which is ahead... So thank you to the DC Environmental Film Festival and all of the incredibly talented filmmakers showcasing their stories over the days ahead. ## Friday, March 21

This March saw the return of our **Annual Youth Program** presented by the **Lucas Kaempfer Foundation**. We screened *Searching for Amani* for an audience of almost 200 **DC Public School students** and followed that with panel discussion (pictured) on conservation and climate journalism. The lively conversation, moderated by Bloomberg Senior Reporter **Jennifer Hijazi**, featured film subjects **Simon Ali** and **Haron Lengus**, and producer **Peter Goetz**.

#### More March 21 Highlights

A **sold out** screening of Yellowstone wolf documentary *Mollie's Pack*, followed by a discussion with director **Thomas Winston** and members of Mollie's family, moderated by **Kristen Brengel**, Senior Vice President of Government Affairs at **National Parks Conservation Association**.

Programming at NYU DC kicked off with special work-in-progress screening of the next film from director **Roger Sorkin** and the American Resiliency Project *Clean Economy NOW*.



## Saturday, March 22

Saturday afternoon featured the US Premiere of *A Life Among Elephants*, this year's Flo Stone and Roger D. Stone Award for Outstanding Artistry in Filmmaking winner. The post-screening conversation (pictured) featured director Nigel Pope and Save the Elephants representatives Saba Douglas-Hamilton (Conservation Ambassador), Kennedy LeMayian (Conservationist & Program Officer), and Frank Pope (CEO), moderated by Bill Gardner, Founder and Executive Producer of Ocean Rock Studios.





## Saturday, March 22 (continued)

Saturday evening was headlined by a special sneak preview screening of *The American Southwest*, the new film by Ben Masters (*The River and The Wall*). The screening was followed by a stacked panel conversation with Masters, American Rivers representative Sinjin Eberle, cinematographer Ryan Olinger and (Pictured) producer Len Necefer, narrator Quannah Chasinghorse, moderated by the *Washington Post's* Dana Hedgpeth.

## Sunday, March 23

We capped off opening weekend of DCEFF 2025 celebrating the finalists of the 2025 Eric Moe Award For Best Short On Sustainability. We were joined by the team from this year's winner *Keeper*, (pictured) director Hannah Rafkin and beekeepers/film subjects Sean and Alaura Flynn. The post-screening discussion also included Allison Argo, director of *Frozen Frames: Murphy's Yellowstone*, and moderator Greg McGruder of National Geographic Society and the DCEFF Board of Directors.

#### More March 23 Highlights

Our screening of *Chasing Time*, presented by the Wayne Hollomon Price Foundation was followed by an inter-generational conversation focused on "Passing the Baton" with filmmaker Sarah Keo, moderated by Maggie Burnette Stogner from American University's Center for Environmental Filmmaking.

The GALA Hispanic Theatre played host for our **World Premiere of** *Drowned Land*, which was a finalist for DCEFF's 2023 Vantage Grant.



### Monday, March 24

Monday night featured a special sold out program presented by HHMI Tangled Bank Studios highlighting their new *Wild Hope* series short *Mission Impossible*. The screening was followed by a conversation with film subject and Impossible Foods Founder Pat Brown (pictured above with the Veg Society of DC), HHMI's Head of Studio Jared Lipworth, and Pepin Tuma, Director of Policy for the Good Food Institute.

#### More March 24 Highlights

We returned to **Georgetown University** for the 3<sup>rd</sup> year in a row for a screening with their **Earth Commons Institute** of Pebble Mine documentary *Unearth*. We were joined by members of the film team and activist **Christina Salmon** for the post-screening conversation.

Programming at the Miracle Theatre kicked off with the DC Premiere of Fatal Watch, followed by a Q&A with co-directors Katie Carpenter and Mark Benjamin, producer Carole Tomko, and Dr. Daniel Pauly.

## Thursday, March 27

For a sold out audience (pictured) at the US Navy Memorial, the team from National Geographic's Pristine Seas gave a special presentation on their their approach to storytelling for impact and how their efforts directly translate into conservation. The unique program included Pristine Seas executive producer Scott Ressler, senior producer Alex Verville, producer Steve Spence, and senior editor Brian Newell, and Greg McGruder of National Geographic Society and the DCEFF Board of Directors.

#### More March 27 Highlights

This year's **Pulitzer Center** shorts program and journalist panel discussion at the **MLK Memorial Library** focused on how global manufacturing shapes local environments.

This evening featured a lineup heavy on **international programs**, with screenings about crows, soil, and green architecture at the **Embassies of Austria and the Netherlands** and the **Italian Cultural Institute**.



## Friday, March 28

On Friday afternoon, we concluded three days of impact programming at the Reservoir Center for Water Solutions. This included the shorts showcase and conversation about the Anacostia and Potomac rivers titled Protecting our Local Waterways (pictured above): Elizabeth Lee Green, Producer, Reviving the Forgotten River). This was followed by a river cleanup event in collaboration with Surfrider's DC chapter (pictured below).





### Friday, March 28 (continued)

Friday night concluded with the presentation of our 2025 William W. Warner Voice of Nature Award to Lowland Kids as part of a special Impact Preview screening focused on sea-level rise and climate refugees. After the film, the packed audience stuck around for a conversation and Q&A (pictured) with producer William Crouse, director Sandra Winther, and the subjects of the film Juliette, Howard, and Chris Brunet. The discussion was moderated by Washington Post climate and science reporter Sarah Kaplan.

#### More March 28 Highlights

We hosted the World Premiere of Raising Aniya with the National Academy of Sciences.

Director John Fiege, film subjects Aniya Wingate and Gretchen Batiste, producers Walter Hull and Chris Lucas, and editor Sofia Chang were in attendance for a conversation moderated by Pete Nelson, Director of Communications for the Gulf Research Program at The National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine.



#### Saturday, March 29

DCEFF 2025 closed with this year's Shared Earth Foundation Award for Advocacy winner *Out of Plain Sight*. Directors Rosanna Xia and Daniel Straub, cinematographer Austin Straub, and film subject Dr. David Valentine were joined by DCEFF Board Member Greg McGruder for an in-depth discussion (pictured) of the new *Los Angeles Times* documentary and how Xia's shocking reporting on toxic waste dumping was brought to the big screen.

"To make a documentary like this where it honors journalism, it celebrates the messiness of science... this is ultimately a film that doesn't tie up things. It's a film that introduces the questions we should be asking."


