## 2025 Festival Overview

From March 20-29, 2025, our 33rd Annual Environmental Film Festival brought 60 programs to 25 venues throughout the nation's capital. Over those ten days, we were joined by over 10,000 audience members, marking a 33% turnout increase since returning to in-person programming in 2023.

In addition to almost 50 film premieres at this year's Festival, DCEFF premiered a new mission statement (below), acknowledging the important role of community-building in our work to bolster the impact of environmental storytelling.

A hallmark of DCEFF's programming has always been our robust panels and Q&As. ## Inspiring the Next Generation

This year, DCEFF expanded its youth engagement efforts through dynamic, accessible programming designed to inspire the next generation of environmental stewards, including the return of our Annual Youth Program. This screening of *Searching for Amani* for 175 DC Public School students was followed by a conversation featuring two of the young journalists from the film.



Additional youth-focused initiatives included 11 screenings and book raffles of *The Wild Robot* with different branches of the DC Public Library and a sneak preview of National Geographic's *Secrets of the Penguins*.

DCEFF also worked to engage budding environmentalists and academics through free screenings at American University, Georgetown University, George Washington University, Johns Hopkins' Bloomberg Center, and New York University's DC satellite.
